А	International, regional and national Responses - Evolving Threats & Challenges - IUU Fishing						
1	Emphasize the importance of defining the Atlantic as a global commons where states from different continents share important strategic interests.						
2	Highlight the relationship between maritime security, food security, and national security. Consider land-based causes, namely political, social, economic, and environmental.						
3	Provide an overview of IUU fishing from a global perspective and assess how non-Atlantic actors can affect IUU Fishing and, subsequently, maritime security in the region. (Mapping IUU fishing in the Atlantic Ocean, focusing on the regions where it is most prevalent).						
4	Analysing the potential links between IUU fishing and other illicit activities within the framework of transnational organized crime in the regions considered (mainly piracy and armed robbery at sea).						
5	Evaluate international, regional, and national responses to IUU Fishing in the Atlantic region and the various challenges its poses to Atlantic states, and how the drivers of maritime insecurity differ at the national and regional levels.
